The first-year TTO students kicked off their bilingual adventure with an unforgettable two-day Boost Camp, filled with laughter, teamwork, and of course — lots of English!





## Day of Languages - Sharing the Power of Language,







To mark the annual Day of Languages, our enthusiastic second-year TTO students took part in a very special project — returning to their former primary schools to share their experiences of bilingual education at Elde College.

The goal was simple but meaningful: to inspire younger pupils by showing them how much can be achieved in just two years of learning in two languages. The second years prepared short presentations about life in the TTO programme, explaining what it means to study subjects in English and how it helps them think more broadly and communicate more confidently.







After their introductions, the real fun began! Each group had designed and taught their own English lesson, fully planned from start to finish. The chosen themes were creative and engaging — from animals and sport, to the human body, and even lessons exploring England and London. The classrooms were soon filled with energy, laughter, and lots of English conversation.

Teachers and pupils alike were impressed by how well our students were able to communicate and manage a classroom — something that can be quite a challenge, even for adults! The second years showed excellent teamwork, preparation, and confidence as they explained new words, played games, and encouraged everyone to take part.



Perhaps the most rewarding part of the day was the chance for our students to reconnect with their old teachers and show them how far they had come. Many former primary school teachers expressed how proud they were to see their students now acting as role models for the younger generation. We would like to thank the schools and teachers who allowed our students to come and give these lessons.

For the TTO students, the experience was both exciting and eye-opening. They realised how much progress they have made in their use of English, and how valuable it is to share that knowledge with others. It was a true celebration of communication, creativity, and cultural connection — the very heart of bilingual education.

The Day of Languages 2025 reminded us that language is more than just words; it's a bridge between people, ideas, and opportunities. And our second years crossed that bridge with confidence and pride!







Exploring AI, Big Data, and Ethics with Guest Speaker Natalie Pollock

Over the past three weeks, our students had the unique opportunity to attend a series of insightful lessons led by Natalie Pollock, an expert in technology, data, and ethics. Her sessions introduced us to the fascinating and sometimes worrying world of Artificial Intelligence (AI), Big Data, and the ethical questions that arise in today's digital society.







The first lesson focused on Big Data and the ways personal information is collected, stored, and used. Natalie explained the difference between a data lake and a data warehouse: in a data lake, all kinds of information exist together in a raw and unstructured form, whereas in a data warehouse, specific, sensitive data is safely stored for easy access when needed. Students were surprised to learn just how often their data is used by large companies, sometimes in ways they don't even notice. This session highlighted the importance of understanding where our data goes and how it can be used.



During the second lesson, students explored Artificial Intelligence and its role in everyday life. Natalie showed how AI powers many apps we use without realizing it. She also shared a thought-provoking video demonstrating how AI can recreate a person's voice or image, sometimes to trick others into revealing personal information. This led to discussions about digital security and online safety, and a reminder that even clever technology can be misused if we're not careful.

The third lesson turned to ethics in the digital world. Using an interactive presentation, students were asked to consider a range of ethical questions about technology and social media. Topics included online privacy, digital responsibility, and the limits of parental monitoring. Students debated, shared opinions, and reflected on questions such as: Should parents monitor our social media? Most agreed that trust and respect are key, emphasizing that ethics is not always clear-cut but is essential to think about when engaging with technology.

Throughout the three sessions, students were actively engaged — asking questions, sharing opinions, and reflecting on how technology impacts their daily lives. The lessons offered not only knowledge about AI and Big Data, but also a chance to develop critical thinking skills and awareness of the ethical considerations that come with digital life.

We would like to thank Natalie Pollock for her time, expertise, and inspiring presentations. Her lessons reminded us that technology is a powerful tool, but one that must be used responsibly, ethically, and thoughtfully. These sessions have left a lasting impression on our students, encouraging them to explore the digital world with curiosity, awareness, and care.


